	Swimming continues to be an area for development. Year 6 went swimming in the Summer term to an external pool. Year 6 also went swimming in year 2. 15 children out of 51 swimmers were competent in swimming 25 metres at the end of year 6 and 20 at Phoenix out of 55. The pool at Phoenix will be re-opened in Autumn 2018 in order to widen the swimming opportunities for children across all year groups from Year 1- Year 6.
