These activities included: hockey, football, street dance, multi skills, basketball, netball and rugby. Enrichment clubs were well attended. The impact was that children had the opportunity to experience different sports from those covered on their curriculum. Also, children had an additional hour across the week of physical activity. 	<p>Swimming continues to be an area for development. Year 6 went swimming in the Summer term to an external pool. Year 6 also went swimming in year 2. 15 children out of 51 swimmers were competent in swimming 25 metres at the end of year 6 and 20 at Phoenix out of 55. The pool at Phoenix will be re-opened in Autumn 2018 in order to widen the swimming opportunities for children across all year groups from Year 1- Year 6.</p>
