Now we need to edit!

Authors edit their work all the time, then they send their work to editors, whose job it is to edit and improve other's work.

What can we look for when we're editing?

<u>WALT edit and improve the effectiveness of our work</u> First, we're going to look at your verbs...

Your verbs should be written in **two** different tenses depending on where they are in the text - present tense and past tense.

We walk to the temple.

We are walking to the temple.

We had walked to the temple.


We were walking to the temple.

We walked to the temple.

We were going to walk to the temple.

What tense are these sentences written in?

<u>Your turn!</u> Go through your verbs, check if they are in the appropriate tense. Work with a partner to check this.



We're going to stay on our verbs, but now think about how we can ensure that they are **powerful**. What do I mean by this?

I go towards her.

What other word could we use instead of 'go'?

Sadness went through my body.

What other word could we use instead of 'went'?

<u>Your turn!</u> Have a look at the verbs that you have used in your writing. Are they powerful? Can you think of words to improve them with?
